China's Social Clock Makes Weddings Important

Translated from the English term “social clock,” it refers to a culturally preferred “timetable” of important transitions in life. It reflects the “normal” social expectations given by a culture about when the transitional events like marriage, having kids, or retirement should take place.

In China, getting married is often not your own choice — it's something others think you should do. For example, at 25, people start pushing you to get married. If you're still single at 30, they say it's “too late.” It's like there's a “social clock” always reminding you: it's time.

This pressure doesn't just make people rush into relationships. It also makes families feel they have to hold a big wedding — like handing in a “life report” to show they are normal, successful, and respectable.

So weddings are no longer just about love. They become big, expensive shows. To meet this invisible deadline, families spend too much money and waste a lot of resources.

China's Face Culture

China has always been a secular country, although it is deeply influenced by Confucian culture, utilitarianism prevails. In today's economic development and urbanization, where individual contacts become less frequent, and personal differences become more significant, the scale of evaluating a person focuses more on their economic status. Therefore, in today's increasingly personalized society, displaying one's economic strength through external features is an important means of maintaining and saving face.

In such an environment, luxury goods, with their low practicality, high scarcity, and high prices, naturally fit Chinese people's desire to emphasize their personal status through important external expressions. Even when it comes to car consumption, global automakers are competing to launch continuously wider and longer car models in China to cater to the Chinese people's love for face. Even if a larger car body generally leads to higher fuel consumption, only the car owner knows about the fuel consumption, but the larger the car, the more face one has, and everyone pays more attention to me.

Wedding food waste is worst in China



The Chinese character “囍” literally means ‘double happiness’. It is commonly written in red for wedding decorations.

If you have Chinese friends, you must have been invited at least once to a big feast – yes, they love to make friends at the dining table. However, you might be surprised by the amount of food they ordered for you. It’s enormous. Perhaps, it is so deeply-rooted in the Chinese culture that, the only way to treat their guests well, is to order more than they need. No wonder in Chinese wedding banquets, it is estimated that almost 1/4 of food is being wasted

Much of the law is designed to cajole the public into better habits, such as ordering “in moderation” and eating “in a civilised and healthy” way, particularly at special occasions. A survey by government researchers reported in 2020 that around 40% of the food served at wedding banquets, business meals and social dinners was wasted. The banqueting culture displays “a bad atmosphere of ostentatiousness, lavishness, and concern for face”,

Twenty years later, they are invited back to a transformed virtual wedding center, witnessing how technology and authority redefine the rituals of love, revealing the complex contradictions behind environmental ideals.

- Synopsis

In 2030, as global environmental awareness rises, the government forms the “Government Wedding Waste Supervision Organization” (GWSO) to comprehensively regulate wedding waste. All weddings must be held at designated farms, with food sourced locally from the farm, and any unregistered items are prohibited. Lay and May become the first couple under supervision, choosing to host their wedding at a chicken farm, where the banquet table is filled entirely with dishes made from eggs. However, Lay secretly brings an unregistered bottle of red wine, which is discovered by a GWSO inspector; the wine is confiscated, and the wedding is abruptly terminated, illustrating the harsh enforcement of government policies.

As time passes, public backlash against such strict controls intensifies, sparking protests. GWSO is compelled to transform the chicken farm into a high-tech “Virtual Wedding Center,” officially opening in 2050. Lay and May are invited back to witness the transformation of the former farm. The main hall displays confiscated contraband items over the past twenty years, with the red wine preserved as one of the confiscated items—a reminder of the importance of compliance.

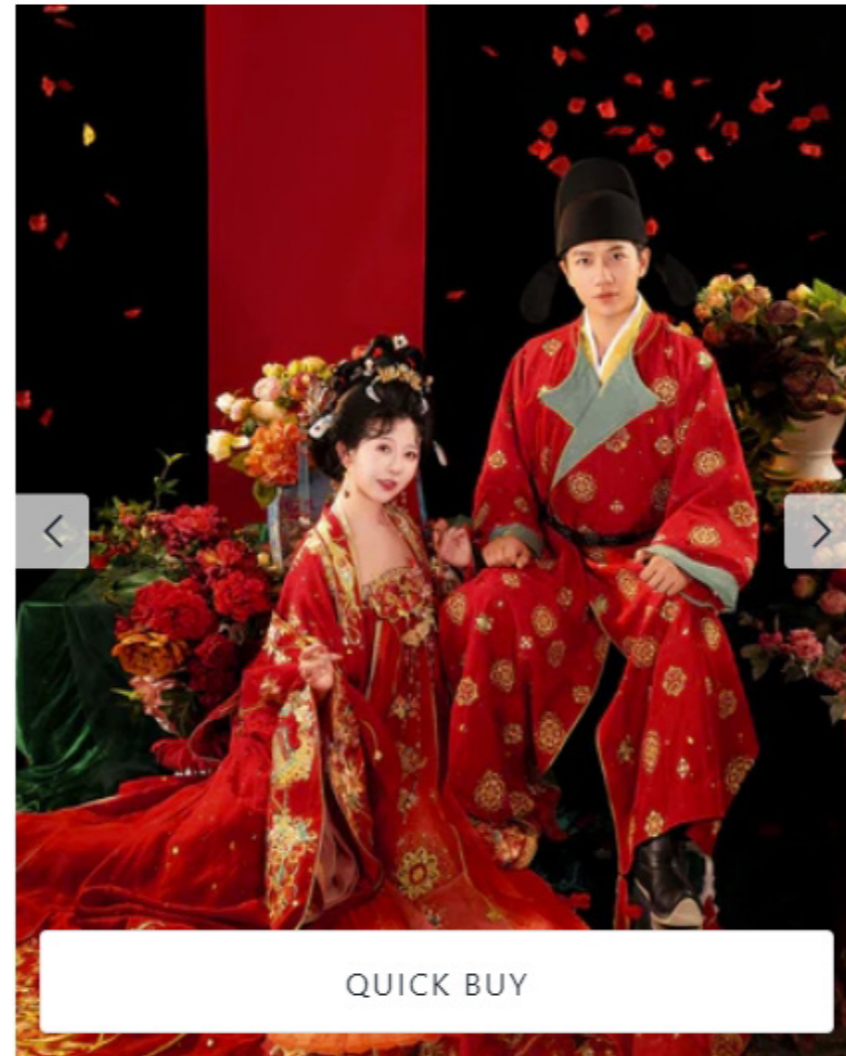
Wearing advanced smart glasses, Lay and May witness a series of bizarre virtual weddings—humans marrying cats, robots, and even pianos. Weddings are packaged into various VIP service levels, becoming a lucrative new revenue source for GWSO. During a high-level gathering, the truth slowly emerges: beneath the guise of environmental protection lies a complex entanglement of power and profit. Human greed and limitations remain visible. Although some problems are solvable, many barriers persist. Because of human weaknesses and desires, the entire system is ironically designed to drive continuous consumption, trapping people in a new cycle.

A large-scale movement five years ago prompted the government to realise that strict management alone was insufficient to implement new wedding policies



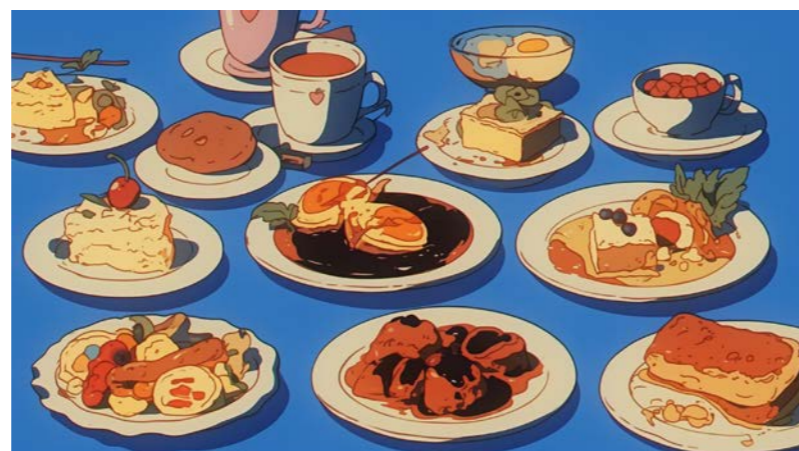
